As I have never been in Canada
I could not advise you to sell

to have good Comfortable buildings
while here there is very few FArms
with good buildings.

I think the best way would

be for one of your Boys to come here –

one in whose judgement you

could depend, and then after

he has resided here for a time,

he would be able to judge

whether you would improve

your circumstances or not, by

the Change.

Improved Farms sell here

at from \$15 [superscript: 00] to \$40 [superscript: 00] per

acre + Wild Land from \$5 to

\$20 – the Average Price of improved

FArms about \$25 [superscript: 00] per acre,

In Southwestern Kansas, there

is plenty of Government Land

mostly Prairie – the Governt [i.e. Government]

gives 160 acres to Actual setters [i.e., settlers],

but [but overwitten: and] the best is almost all

claimed by settlers – but a

man with a few hundred

Dollars could purchase a

good claim with some improv

ments – In Kansas they have

a Stock Law, and the

farms lie open, the owners of

Stock are required to keep

them enclosed in a Pasture

which is almost all the fence

required - Here Horses, Cattle

Hogs + Sheep, run on the

open Range – you are aware that Prairies are covered

with wild Grasses, tho [i.e. though] after
the Land has been pastured
very closely for a few years, Blue
Grass comes in, and supercedes
the Wild Grasses. –

It seems to me is if, there is
a good opening here for a Cheese
factory, as Cows are very easely [i.e. easily]
ketpt [i.e. kept], and Cheese frequently command a better price than butter
I do not Know of a Cheese factory
in all South West Missouri.
